The School as a Learning Community

Everybody knows that education is about learning. However, the idea of learning is more than course syllabi, curricula, lesson plans, and creative teaching. A true learning community tries to improve continually and to update knowledge in their field as well as discover new and creative ways to teach. A learning community encourages continual learning process that involves students, teachers, instructors, administrators, and support staff. The learning community can sit at the same table and freely talk, debate, and discuss. All members are equal and everyone has something of value to bring to the table.

The School as a Supportive Community

Some members of the community (for example, new teachers or those staff members who experience health problems or other personal difficulties) may need more support than others. A supportive community:

- Recognizes special days such as birthdays, marriages, the birth of children to staff members and so on.
- Incorporates social activities into school meetings.
- Communicates regularly with community members who are on sick leave or have a long term disability.
- Is empathic when individual problems occur and offers help.

The School as a Collaborative Community

Collaboration is sharing, discussing, listening, and testing. Collaboration means that professionals want to put aside personal agendas for group goals and common results. In collaborative communities all contributions are valuable. The sharing of individual classroom success lets other teachers to recreate that success. There is no "blame game" in collaborate school communities. Members take personal responsibility and are always ready to change when needed.
